
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The Editor's Walk



Mini-Retrospective*: MacGregor's corner

... with George Wagner, our "casual historian"



We thought it might be fun to share a location with photos and descriptions of the many layers of history that make today's story – a Mini-Retrospective if you will.

Everyone who comes into downtown Havre de Grace has passed the corner where MacGregor's Restaurant is located. That would be the corner of St. John and Franklin Streets. We often make reference to it when a tourist asks where they might eat and enjoy a water view. MacGregor's at the top of the hill and Tidewater Grille at the bottom are always recommended. Each has

indoor and outdoor seating with wonderful views of the water, the Amtrak passing on the railroad bridge, and the Osprey fishing for their dinner. You might even notice a heron quietly stalking its dinner.





In the early history of our city, the waterfront was primarily commercial. Busy with a variety of mills, commercial fishing, canneries, transportation, and more, we start this mini-retrospective of MacGregor's corner with a photo of the old grist mill. The sign reads: John L. Cook, Flour, Meal & Feed Grist Grinding. At this time, streets were dirt and many paved with oyster shells.

Then the grist mill became the Havre de Grace Banking & Trust Co. From the MD Historical Trust site: https://mht.maryland.gov, we learn the following from HA-1181:

This building, the second location of the Havre de Grace Banking and Trust Company was built in 1924 in a style influenced by Renaissance Classicism. It is a two story polygonal building with a limestone ashlar façade with copper trim on the windows and doors. The rear of the building is brick.

From an interview with Cecil Hill, Sr., we share his memory of his first job when he was 12-13 years old (1952-53):

"... back in those days, they gave me a key to the deadbolt in the front — right where McGregor's door goes in. I'd unbolt it. Go inside. Bolt myself in. Go past all the old cages, past the safe, and on into the room where they make the coffee and serve the ice. Then I'd go downstairs and file cards for a whole summer on Saturdays. They were cards that people filled out and I filed them."

In the 1970s the building became Ruth's School of Beauty Culture, owned and operated by Ruth Sterback (Sterbak). Later her son, Fritz Sterback (Sterbak) bought the building and used it to sell antiques and to build brass beds before moving to Market Street.

In 1985, Cecil Hill, Sr. purchased the building from the Sterbacks to open a restaurant. From his interview:

"... We bought the building and converted it to a restaurant. None of us (his partners) knew how to run a restaurant. But we ended up more or less putting a feather in our cap in the end. We didn't make any money, but we sold it to Dan Lee who came out of Bel Air from Georgetown North. ... He leased the restaurant for five years. Then he (Dan Lee) bought the business and celebrated 31 years in 2018."

Dan Lee with his wife, Cindy, have renovated the building inside and out, adding a beautiful dining area that offers windows on the Susquehanna River as well as a deck area. Even more recently, they extended the beautiful outdoor deck where it comfortably offers a great view. Stop in and enjoy a fine menu in the pub, the dining area, or on the deck.

The next time you're passing by the MacGregor's corner at St. John and Franklin, stop for a minute. Walk around the area and try to imagine what it was like when it was a busy, commercial waterfront.

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If you are looking for biking or hiking trails this fall season, think about Havre de Grace. Havre de Grace is home to natural trails, like the North Park Loop Trail along the Susquehanna River, and historic trails, like the Lafayette Trail or Surviving Structures of the War of 1812. With our historic waterfront town punctuated by beautiful, established trees, autumn is the perfect backdrop to go trekking our traditional residential streets, explore our downtown, or amble our waterfront.

Havre de Grace is connected to the larger region by way of the Lower Susquehanna Heritage Greenway, with segments through breathtaking Susquehanna State Park and along the shores of Cecil County. Off-road biking is particularly satisfying due to flat, even grades along the west side of the river that are available from the Deer Creek bridge crossing to the Conowingo Dam. The East Coast Greenway connects us to the mid-Atlantic region, with ECG trail-blaze signs that you can now discover in places like Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Annapolis. The East Coast Greenway connects both older and newer communities within Havre de Grace to Bel Air and beyond.



Scenic back roads to and through the Susquehanna State Park are indescribably beautiful this time of year, with favorites like Rock Run Road – that parallels the creek of the same name - or Stafford Road that follows the river and then sweeps you to the village of Darlington. Hidden, unassuming ribbons of trails - high intensity, not-for-the-faint-of-heart work-out trails - thread through the State parklands to the bluffs of Steppingstone. All of these inspire a different outlook, away from the frenzy of the day, with the crisp-air scent of fall. Please enjoy weekends or weekdays (mini-vacations that you gift yourself) as time allows.

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

"Having access to the original gateway Lockhouse, still maintained by the local historical society, was an absolute thrill and it gave me my first backdrop. Once the core characters of the story tumbled out of my imagination and onto the computer screen in front of me, they almost took on their own life. They frequently went in directions I had not planned in the earlier part of the day but evolved as the story evolved. Ben and Sonja, and their sons Isaac and Aaron, ARE the 19th century. Ben was born on January 1, 1800, Sonja in 1805. The Pulaski experience encompasses the national experiences of that century, but through the eyes of a Maryland family on the canals. The Pulaskis travel between Maryland, a slave state, into Pennsylvania, a free state, which awakens them to a higher moral law over the Maryland laws of slavery. As their awareness and commitment grows they become bolder in their actions to free slaves.

Now they are dear friends, and I look forward to keeping their story going through their years to come. Each book is defined by specific sequential years and as the Pulaskis advance toward the culmination of the story. The reader will experience the changes that occurred in our country over the following decades through them."

Robert is a member of the Historical Novel Society, the Surf Side Writer's group, and a past president of the South Carolina Writer's Association. He currently lives in Murrells Inlet, South Carolina with his patient wife, Sandi, who supports his love of Havre de Grace and his frequent returns to the little town he calls "that exquisite gem at the head of the Chesapeake Bay."





I asked Shaun when he became a pro – or considered himself a pro.

I had a dream to be a pro. All tournaments are open these days. If you have the money, you can play. In 2000 or 2001 I played in the US Open. I came in 17th at that time, I was only 20. I actually got kicked out of a number of local pool leagues because I was considered a pro. It was hard on my granddad because I couldn't play in the local leagues. At first, I was pretty upset. But then I took it as a challenge. I now was going to put more work in to beat the pros. It wasn't easy. I would play a number of local pool tours — open, regional events.



Probably around 2006, I recommitted – I was 25. I had spent a few years doing more partying and such, where pool wasn't a top priority. It was still there, but I wasn't quite doing what I loved. My uncle and aunt asked me one day, "Well, Shaun, what do you want to do with your life?" I said, "Oh, I don't know. I just want to play pool."

That was the change. I decided. I decided I'm going to hit the Pro Tour. And that's what I did. In 2006 I won one of my biggest tournaments ever, the North Carolina State Open. I came right back and won the US Open Warm-Up Tournament. That year I also played the US Open – coming in 17th again.

This opened up my passion and commitment to pool. Last year I went to the World Games, one of two representing the USA in Poland. He mentions that he's also played in Dubai!

Shaun pauses for a moment, and then continues.

I'm 8 years sober. Yes, I make a living from pool. Of course, I'm fortunate with my family and that I have my grandparents. I live with them. I never knew my dad. My mom, Ginny (Juanita Wilkie) ... I survived cancer. She didn't. I was 14 years old. My grandparents are my mom's parents; I chose to stay with them.

He pauses again, to remember is emotional.

I play pool for her (my mother). She was one of my biggest supporters. I have a memory. I was about 10 and at the carnivals they had pool tables. Here in Havre de Grace, 4th of July 1991, I'm standing with my mom and maybe my aunt, watching the game, and mom says, "Do you want to try?" She gave me \$10. I won the game! I won a lion; it was about 3 feet tall. I still have it.

So what's in your future? Any plans?

Well, I have a girlfriend, Meredith Lynch. We've been together about 1-1/2 years. She's a massage therapist and a semi-pro player. She's a writer, a kind of side passion. She also loves to draw.

I have one big goal for pool

to get to the Mosconi
Cup. I've been close twice.
I'm focused for next year!



Hopefully, we'll win because Europe has won the last 8 years in a row.

The Mosconi Cup is an annual 9-ball pool tournament between Europe and the U.S. since 1994. According to Wikipedia, the trophy is named after an American player Willie Mosconi and has been compared to the Ryder Cup in golf. One year they play in Europe (London); the next they play in the U.S. (Las Vegas).

In about 2-1/2 years I'll be 40. I won't quit pool, but I'll play mostly locally/regionally. I've discovered that I'm very passionate about nature and photography. A photographer at the Conowingo Dam saw one of my photos and told me I had a good eye. He encouraged me to get a slightly better camera and lens. I'd like to do nature photography more often. It's becoming a new passion.

We wish Shaun success in his reach for the Mosconi Cup and a win. We wish him well in his relationship with Meredith and his future in nature photography. In the meantime, we'll be enjoying his pool career with updates via Shaun and Rodger's House Tavern. If you're so inclined, you are welcome to take part in the Pool Leagues at Rodger's House or to watch your favorite player. There are many others that do not fit the stereotypes we have. Let this be just one of those articles that help you tilt your head slightly to gain a different perspective.

To Shaun's granddad, John Wilkie, I can only say, "Job well done."

Meet Shaun Wilkie!

Shaun Wilkie, a Havre de Grace native, plays pool for a living. He has tattoos. You'll find him often shooting pool at Rodgers House Tavern in the center of town. But there are other descriptive words for Shaun that include humble, quiet, Christian, cancer survivor, determined.

You might wonder how this interview came about. When Wayne Meinschein, Jr. of Rodgers House Tavern passed away in May of this year, I wanted to acknowledge his influence in our community. The family-owned, neighborhood bar and billiards club is in an 18th century tavern with a lot of history. Wayne brought an easy smile, conversation, love of sports and plenty of laughter when he was bartending. He also loved pool and encouraged leagues. He was just a warm human being.



It was during this time that I learned about "Get Some" Shaun Wilkie. I had noticed the eulogy he gave for Wayne. It included these comments: Wayne was truly one of my dearest, closest and most loyal friends on this place we call Earth!!! ... He was there to greet us at the bar, provide food and generosity to customers and also if you are a sports fan, he had plenty of knowledge and arguments to share with others!

Then I noticed a few social media posts where Shaun was playing in the U.S. Open 10-Ball Championship in Las Vegas, July 2018. I had also forgotten that Shaun had contacted me last April about offering some photographs for the magazine. Now I was curious. I caught up with in him in August for an interview.

When and how did you first get interested in pool?

Well, I'm a cancer survivor from Johns Hopkins. I was diagnosed around 6 years old with a stomach tumor; in and out of Hopkins for about two years with radiation and chemo treatments. Thankfully the Lord decided to save me and I had my family all around me. As I was recovering at Ronald McDonald House, I was weak and still in a wheelchair. My granddad noticed the pool table and said, "Hey, you want to shoot some pool or just roll the balls around?" That's actually where I started. My granddad played pool himself.

As I got home and started getting better, getting my weight back up, my hair returning, getting energy back, my granddad would take me to APG, to the Rec. Center, and I'd play ... oh ... maybe 3-4 hours a day for 2-3 years! That's all I wanted to do. It was a process. And I loved it!


Listening to Shaun, the movie The Karate Kid comes to mind and I'm picturing Mr. Miyagi mentoring Daniel (the karate kid) as Shaun talks about his granddad. He continues.

I would say it was a journey. I didn't know I was going to be a pro. I just kept pushing. My granddad could tell I loved playing pool. It was a blessing.

My granddad taught me all he could. He'd take me to little Junior Tournaments. Then he'd say, "Look, I don't have too much more I can teach you. Go play the tournament. Learn all you can. You're gonna lose, learn from your mistakes. That's okay. That's how you learn. It's up to you now!"
