The next day we learned that, indeed, someone was filming a scene for an independent, local production. We never did learn any more about it.

number of shows have been filmed here over the last couple decades that you might recognize *(well, except the first one)*. Film production not only brings the excitement of actors and actresses coming to our city, but it offers an economic boost. It creates a buzz, bringing folks into town to try to 'get a peek' or to just meet for coffee and talk about it. They hire local actors as 'extras' and often local laborers to help with production needs. They purchase many items from local shops for props. The city gets great media coverage. Often a shop space is rented so that they can prep it for a specific scene. Cast and crew often make personal visits to local restaurants and shops. While it may interrupt for a time, it most often is a real asset! Here are some titles that you may not know were filmed partly in Havre de Grace and the fictional names of our town!



CHECKERS © 1919 • Adventure, Comedy, Drama





The memory above made me think about movies and tv series that have been filmed here in Havre de Grace. The oldest I could find was discovered while researching for our first fall Graw Days 2008-2014, celebrating the Havre de Grace Race Track (1912-1950). I had found the sheet music for "Checkers," © 1919. It had been a screen play by Harry Blossom and in 1919 a very successful silent film. The

folks at the Smithsonian confirmed that it was indeed filmed at our race track, but there were no copies to be found.

TUCK EVERLASTING

Tuck Everlasting was filmed in several locations in Maryland. In Havre de Grace they used the Blenheim Mansion in Bulle Rock for filming. It was a beautiful old house with amazing history.

Steeped In Tradition

Nearly 300 years ago, James Samuel Patton brought to this country the original American thoroughbred, named Bulle Rock. Years later, Patton's granddaughter married the owner of Blenheim Stud Farm in Maryland and brought with her a colt from Bulle Rock's bloodline. Now, centuries later, The Residences at Bulle Rock sits on the same tract of land as did Blenheim Farm. We're proud of our heritage.



And prouder still that our community is on land just as stunning and perfect as when the original American Thoroughbreds galloped across the hills. *From blueerockresorthomes.com*

In the film, it is Winnie's home. The house has since been demolished. The production company also came to John Stephens of Stephens & Stephens Clock Shop and recreated the shop on the main street of Berlin, MD. In the photo he's with his granddaughter, Chandler Blake. She's



all grown up now and managing the clock shop!

Jimmyo, describe Chainsaw Sally.



So I did a movie called Chainsaw Sally. Then I did a movie called the Good Sisters. Next I completed a streaming series - two seasons of the Chainsaw Sally Show. I recently took a break from working on a cartoon to begin production on the third season of the Chainsaw Sally Show.

Chainsaw Sally is essentially the Batman story, except instead of a young millionaire who's raised with money and a butler; she's a young girl who is poor and kind of left to

her own devices. She sees her parents murdered and just kind of becomes this off-the- rails vigilante.

Okay. But is she a good person or a bad person?

She is what I would call an antihero. So she's not particularly good, but she's not ... she's nuts. Like she winds up as the town's librarian in the movie and kills a person for returning a book very late. At one point she killed somebody because they had too many items in the 10 items or less line. Chainsaw Sally is played by my wife, April Monique Burril.

So this is an adult movie/series? What kind of people like this kind of story?

Yeah, this is an adult storyline. (As to who likes it) evidently quite a few because there are people with Chainsaw Sally tattoos all over the world! We have this kind of interesting little, cult fan base thing. But it's global. I mean, we get fan letters from Japan, from France, from Australia. We have fans here too. We wound up signing autographs at Home Depot one day just because we were there shopping. It's just this weird little – like you either know us or you don't.

Are your movies available online?

The movie, Chainsaw Sally, and the series are available for purchase on Amazon. They're presently not streaming them on Amazon or Netflix because I've been collecting all of my rights back from various distributors. I'm hoping to get a deal with all of the Sally features through Shudder Streaming Services or some other larger streaming service. Chainsaw Sally was released in 2007 followed by the series.



So what was the Good Sisters about?



The Good Sisters was a witch movie. They were two descendants of Sarah Good, who was killed as a witch in Salem. It's a supernatural thriller and was shot here in Havre de Grace. We actually shot it in Bill Price's house! This movie was released in 2009 and is also available on Amazon.

in Havre de Grace and Perryville, using local actors?

Yes, but we did have a couple famous ones. Gunnar Hansen, who played Sally's father in the Chainsaw Sally movie, was the original Leatherface in the Texas Chainsaw Massacre. Herschell Gordon Lewis, long known as the "Godfather of Gore" because he was one of the first to put out actually bloody movies in the 60s, did a cameo in the movie. Both of these men have since died.

When we first talked, you were sharing a new movie you were going to be working on here in Havre de Grace.Want to explain?

Yes, it's the third series of Chainsaw Sally. It will be six episodes. We'll start as soon as the stayat-home order is lifted and it will probably take the summer to complete. I hope to have a deal confirmed so that I can release the new series with all of the Chainsaw Sally productions.

Another film recognized by the horror genre is his 2003 movie, Silver Scream (2003). Jimmyo is multi-talented: painter to cartoonist, actor to film production, writer to director, musician, and other artsyfartsy stuff. Don't be taken aback by his size and rather somber demeanor. Get him talking about his passions and he changes into a smiling, animated, super fun guy. The State Theater Is Reborn!

ocated just a few doors down from MacGregor's Restaurant at 325 St. John Street, new life has come to the The State Theater of 1927! Like many of our buildings, the history of this theater mirrors the history of our community. As times changed, so did the use of the building.

In 1910 the Bijou Dream Motion Picture Theater opened next to the Willou Theater. For a time under the same ownership, these two theaters co-existed, sharing films through a custom passageway – our first multiplex!



In 1925 a fire destroyed The Willou and extensively damaged the Bijou. In 1927 it reopened as The State Theater and thrived through the 60s, closing in 1973.

Cathy Deibel, whose father George Elder, Sr. managed the State Theater for Durkee Enterprises, shared stories of working the candy counter, Saturday morning serials, staying at the theater during the 1958 blizzard because the electric came on in town before it did on their farm, Santa Claus arriving every Christmas, and a murder!



Cathy explained, "In 1965, a man murdered his estranged wife in the theater and as he ran out, my dad tackled him and held him down till the police came."

The suspect was Ronald Dubs, who shot his estranged wife, Katherine, with a .22 caliber pistol in the theater lobby on January 28, 1965.

"My dad always said growing up it was kind of funny, because the name of the movie was "Your Cheatin' Heart," said Cathy.



Before Renovations

She added, "There's hardly a person in town around my age that hasn't told me already about the time they got kicked out of the State Theater by my father because he was pretty touchy about certain things. If you had your foot on the seat in front of you, out you go! He didn't want you to chew gum because then he had to scrape it off the seats. So yeah, he was very strict about it. There are many, many people that were kicked out at least once."

In 1982 the HdG Development Corp., after additional renovations, reopened the theater as The Lafayette. It faltered and was closed by the early 1990's. Many residents will remember the Evangelistic Church of Deliverance from the mid-1990's until the early 2000's.

Today, following 2 years of renovations and hours and hours of elbow grease, The State is back!

While the 'Stay-at-Home Order' is in place, the State Theater will have a number of online programs. Jared Noe, owner, encourages us to be sure to make plans to see this building when we can once again gather. They've done a remarkable job adding to our Arts & Entertainment District!

The State Theater of Havre de Grace is Harford County's premier destination for live entertainment and creative productions. Connor Sheffield



15 year old Connor may be slight in build, but he's a giant in character.

How do I begin to describe Connor's journey in a little more than a page. WOW! Let's see:

- > A young teen with big dreams.
- A young teen dealing with a disease called Gastrointestinal Dysmotility.
- A compassionate young teen who wanted to do something for others like him: Enter ProjectBIG.
- A young teen that races 270 Sprints and 600 Sprints as Connor Sheffield Racing.
- A young teen that took a medical marijuana battle to the MD State Legislature and WON!
- > Ostomy Athlete who is just learning to live his best life.



Those are the bullet points. But this young man is, in one word, HEROIC! I've written about him on this magazine's blog. I started following his mother Tricia Sheffield's FB posts back in December 2018. She was so open in sharing their day by day trials and small triumphs as they tried to find a way to deal with Connor's

health problems. He couldn't eat because he couldn't keep food down. He couldn't gain weight. He dealt with a lot of pain. His issues were/are neurological. He went from one major hospital and unique treatment to another searching for relief. On his medical journey, Connor met many others suffering similar issues. He was upset that he often had to go to Philadelphia and beyond to get help. While he was hospitalized, he wondered why there wasn't a center that could handle long-term care for pediatric motility patients. This resulted in the creation of **ProjectBIG**. (http://



projectbig.org). His goal is to create a Pediatric Motility Center at Johns Hopkins, which will take a lot of money. At present, the money they raise through their Gala and other events will be used for research and to focus on whatever help they can give these kids.

This past year, in a great effort to find relief and not have to use a feeding tube, Connor and his mom decided to learn more about medical marijuana. I find it amazing the amount of information Tricia researches. As it turns out, after trying several formulas via doctor's prescription, Connor found success. Not only was he able to eat, but pain lessened. He was able to return to school. Most importantly, he started gaining weight.

Then they met another stumbling block – they don't believe in roadblocks! Connor had to take a dose of his meds at lunchtime and after school if he stayed late. To do that, he was not allowed to take it in school. The nurse was not allowed to administer it. Instead, one of his parents had to leave work, sign him out of school, take him



across the street off school property, give him the drop under his tongue, and sign him back into school. So, as Connor's family has always done, they took action.

It wasn't long until he met others with the same problem. Connor's Courage was created and they went to every politician they could reach from our local mayor and city council to the Governor. Connor, his mom, and his dad Michael each shared the story in any
