

# **Rodgers Tavern: A Traveler's Haven in Perryville**

The visitor to today's Perryville might look at Rodgers Tavern and see a beautiful, restored stone building with a welcoming front porch and an inviting tree-shaded lawn. But to our ancestors Rodgers Tavern was a place of rest for the weary traveler, a place of refreshment for the hungry visitor, and a place of education for all things politic in the nation's earliest days.

#### Origins of the Tavern

Rodgers Tavern is a monument to America's early history and a reminder of a past way of life in Cecil County. Built in the early 18th century, it was known as the Ferry house and also as Stevenson's Tavern, before the more familiar name of Rodgers Tavern.

The Tavern was a necessary and popular stop for travelers on the east coast as the Tavern was at the eastern terminus of the ferryboat to transport travelers across the Susquehanna River, established in 1695. The necessity of crossing the river to get from New York and Pennsylvania to Washington and all points south, made Rodgers Tavern and the ferryboat service a very, busy place, indeed!

Rodgers Tavern was located on what was known as the "Post Road" between Baltimore and Philadelphia. Said one of the many travelers along this north-south thoroughfare, James Kent, in 1791, "This River is one mile wide here; a view up the river as we cross the ferry is very romantic, an island is just above and the banks are steep and rugged."

#### **Guess Who Slept Here?**

It would seem that Rodgers Tavern should have kept the seemingly more appropriate name of the Ferry House, but the fame and import of the



Rodgers family who lived there and kept the tavern, was cause enough to change the name. John Rodgers raised and commanded a company of militia in the defense of Maryland in 1775. Rodgers Tavern with its strategic location on the Post Road prompted such notables as George Washington, Comte de Rochambeau and Marquis de Lafayette to tarry with the Rodgers family for lodging and dining. Indeed, one year after John Rodgers purchased the tavern in 1781, George Washington brought officers and troops to the ferry crossing on the Susquehanna he was abundantly familiar with en route to the victorious campaign against Cornwallis at Yorktown.

But it was not just the father of our Country who enjoyed the hospitality to be found at Rodgers Tavern. Other Presidents such as James Madison and Thomas Jefferson would partake of the amenities offered at the Tavern. The Tavern was known for delicious food and fine entertainment, not to mention its strategic location, which likely enticed notables such as Madison and Jefferson. As hundreds of canvasback ducks were the constant view on the Chesapeake Bay, this delicacy was the frequent fare

on the menu as well as the bounty of fruits and vegetables grown in Cecil's rich soil.

#### The Rodgers Family

Col. John and Elizabeth Rodgers were a fascinating couple who did much to ease the travels of their many visitors, all while rearing eight children who earned fame in their own right. Ann Marie Rodgers married William Pinkney, a famous Old Line State orator and jurist. Two sons, John and George Washington Rodgers, became Commodores in the United States Navy, while another son, Thomas, was a noted physician.

Commodore John Rodgers' naval service was from 1798 to 1838. He was highly respected and became known as the Founder of the American navy. He served as a 1st Lieutenant on the maiden voyage of the *U.S.S.Constellation* and during the War of 1812 he is credited with saving Baltimore from ruin by the British. Distinguised military service in the Rodgers family began with John and continues even today.

#### Saving the Tavern

Rodgers Tavern was operated during and after the Civil War until at least 1886. The erection of a railroad bridge across the Susquehanna River in 1866 would eventually put an end to the ferryboat service, and ultimately the tavern that relied upon that service. Train transportation rang the death knell for the ferryboat service and the heavy use of the old Post Road, as well as the tavern. The Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington Railroad stepped in to purchase Rodgers Tavern. So began a long period of deterioration, neglect and near ruin for the storied

# Perryville's Community Park ... a world away on the bay

It used to be when the Old Post Road was the primary route of travel between Philadelphia and Baltimore that Perryville was THE place to stop to relax, recuperate and rejuvenate before heading off on the next leg of the journey. But the only constant is change. As trains replaced water

transport, cars replaced commercial transportation, and airplanes replaced trains Perryville became a place you drove by and noticed signs for while traveling I-95 and Route 40. Much the same can be said for a number of small towns that dot the landscape on the extended borders to these main roads through Maryland

and volleyball courts, and baseball and softball fields - a necessity in a town that has strong tradition of Little League sports.

The youngsters are sure to enjoy the playground and the picnic area. The pavilions

are frequent stops for fmaily gatherings or just a quick picnic in the great outdoors.

Perryville's Community Park is also available for larger events, for groups who would like to reserve the pavilion or other facilities An application can be obtained and completed at the

Town Hall, located at 515 Broad Street, Perryville. Permits are \$25 with a nominal charge of 50 cents per person for each person in excess of 80

However, the Town of Perryville should not be overlooked by today's traveler. tavern that had once welcomed America's founding fathers

Finally the Society for the Preservation of Maryland Antiquities purchased the building in 1956, and the organization, Friends of Rodgers Tavern, was organized to preserve and restore the glorious Tavern. Rodgers Tavern was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1972. The effort to maintain the tavern and historical preservation continues.

#### When You Visit

Rodgers Tavern is open throughout the year during a host of community events in Perryville. The observant historian visiting the tavern should note the charming simple stone exterior. The main floor consists of two parlors, a public room and a tiny office. In the front parlor the original 18th century paneling remains as well as the impressive dated fire back which was cast locally at Principio Ironworks, dated 1771.

The tavern is located at 259 Broad Street and the grounds upon which it sits offer a romantic and breathtaking view of the Susquehanna River, head of the Chesapeake Bay and a view of the City of Havre de Grace across the river.

Rodgers Tavern also had a collection of artifacts and historical interpretation materials and is open to the public on Saturdays and Sundays, 1-4 p.m., May through October (unless the facility has been leased out). Group or individual tours are asked to make appointments in advance throughout the year by calling 410-642-3703 or submitting an e-mail to rtavern@iximd.com

It is also available for lease through the Town of Perryville. For information call 410-642-6066, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

# **1860s Flavor at Port's Candlelight Tour**

The incredible success of Port Deposit's 2003 Candlelight Tour prompted the committee to make it an annual event! This year a number of houses have been added to the tour, as well as town businesses and churches.

The tour coincides with the projected release date of a new book to be published by Port Deposit Heritage Corporation. Tentatively the title will be A Snowball's Chance: The Lives and Letters of Snow's Battery B. The book contains never-before-published letters and photographs of the men who served in Battery B, 1st Maryland Light Artillery, primarily from Port Deposit, the 7th District of Cecil County and environs during the Civil War.

The 2003 season of the Paw Paw Museum has featured a Civil War exhibit around these letters and the men in the battery. That theme has extended to the candlelight Tour with costumed re-enactors leading historic walking tours of the town on the Susquehanna River, the release of the book and other special touches.

Among these will be historic interpretation of a Civil War soldier from the area at each of the homes or properties on the tour, or an interpretation of Civil War related information, to tie-in to the contemporary use of the properties involved.

Port Deposit Heritage Corporation plans to feature such local notables as: 1st Lt. L.A.C. Gerry, Captain Alonzo Snow, 1st Lt. Theodore J. Vanneman, Jacob Tome and John A.J. Creswell. Members of


other Civil War units who resided in Port Deposit will also be featured, as well as some outstanding Civil War soldiers and veterans from beyond Port Deposit such as Major Ben Ricketts and Chaplain Joseph T. Brown.

Properties that have a Civil War connection but are not part of the tour itself, will also be interpreted with outdoor temporary signage, including Howard Chapel, the Tome's Landing Waterfront, Jefferson Hall side yard, and others.

# **Civil War Soldiers Speak In Their Own Words**

Fredericksburg - Antietam - the Lynchburg Campaign - Andersonville. All are familiar Civil War names to most armchair historians. But New Bridge, Malvern hill, Crampton's Gap, Harrison's Landing, New Market and the Florence Stockade might not ring any bells to the cursory observer. Likewise, the names of Alonzo Snow, Lucius Artabanus Cornelius Gerry, Theodore Vanneman and Chromus Alexander, obviously names of an historic yesteryear flavor are not likely to be recalled by

Port Deposit Heritage Corporation is set to release their newest literary effort. Tentatively titled A Snowball's Chance: The Lives and Letters of Snow's Battery B, the book offers a glimpse of Port Deposit and the surrounding area during the Civil War from 1861 to 1865. Built upon a treasure trove of authentic Cviil War letters written by men and officers in Snow's Battery B. 1st Maryland Light Artillery, during the conflict. The book goes beyond the letters to describe the tenor of the area prior to and during the war, the actions and activities occurring back home while Snow's Batter was in Virginia, and details the lives and happenings of the men following the conflict.

"It's been a long-time coming," say Erika L. Quesenbery, curator of the Paw Paw Museum in Pon Deposit. Erika compiled the letters and wrote aditional text for the book. "Years of research have gone into this publication and untold miles from bisiting Antietam, to National Archives, to the Union Room to pretty much every cemetery in the 7th District, not to mention cemeteries in Pennsylvania, Delaware, Baltimore and Harford County.

Erika's research has resulted in the discovery of the final resting places for many of the men, which is included as a listing in the book. American flags were placed over the graves of these veterans, some for the first time in decades.

"The lion's share of the letters are from or to oficers, namely 1st Lt. Theodore Vanneman or 1st Lt. L.A.C. Gerry, " Erika explians. "But I wanted the book to be more than a study of these two men, as amazing as they were, and to look at the lives of the enlisted man not just the ones with stripes on their sleeves."

> In an effort to achieve this goal, Erika refused census data and

visited cemeteries, Official Records, family histories and newspaper archives to learn more about the men in Battery B.

"Obviously there is a great deal of information about Gerry and Vanneman, as they were consummate letter writes and their descendants did an amazing job of preserving their family history, ephemera and other items, "Erika explains. "People visit Port Deposit all the time and stop to read the signage at the Gerry House or the Snow's Battery marker."

"But it's not just the homes of Gerry and Vanneman that survive, it is their story pre-Civil War to G.A.R. reunions that is so very interesting," she states. The Gerry House is considered a signature property and is the most often photographed or painted structure on Main Street. It is admired by visitors during the Candlelight Tours. "I think those same people will find this book invaluable, Erika shares. "They will be able to hear Gerry speak in his own words about Lincoln, Stanton, McClellan, Fredericksburg and learn more about him."

The book is not crafted solely for the Civil War

Researcher. Indeed, every effort has been made to provide overviews of the battles in which the Battery fought to make for an easier and informative read for those who do not have an intimate knowledge of the Civil War. Further, the scope of the book is expanded to give an understanding of the tenor of events in Port Deposit, Perryville, Conowingo and Havre de Grace during the conflict. This includes the arrest of Maryland legislators, the great Civil War Mule School in Perryville, Lincoln's ride through Perryville and Havre de Grace to his inauguration and the projected exploding of the Conowingo Covered Bridge to hinder troop movements.

The 400-page book is going through its final edit with a publication release date scheduled for December 6th, the day of the Port Deposit Candlelight Tour. During the event the author will be in period costume conducting historic walking tous of the town. She'll also be available for book

Gospel Explosion 2004 will kick off events in February. Come hear the annual event filled with two and a half hours of spirit and song, which will feature a special headliner. The concert begins at 2 p.m. Feb. 1st.

On Feb. 6th, *The Four Bitchin' Babes* will visit the Center to perform a concert at 8 p.m. These four well-known, contemporary folk singers – Suzzy Roche, Camille West, Debi Smith and Sally Fingerett – are bringing their sharp social commentary and four part harmonies to the Center. 
